	have tourniquets."
Dennis Douda speaking	Dr. Jenkins says tourniquets should always
	be kept readily accessible.
Dr. Donald Jenkins speaking	"We're going to turn this windlass until
	the bleeding stops and we feel that
	there's no pulse."
Dennis Douda speaking	And he recommends this high-quality
	design, the kind stocked in emergency
	department trauma rooms.
Maria Flor speaking	"Still in pretty good shape, so back in the
	truck again."
Dennis Douda speaking	A Father's Day gift, that keeps on giving.
Randy Therkilsen speaking	"Good things to have when you need
	'em!"

Anchor tag: Besides farmers and industrial workers, Dr. Jenkins says kidney dialysis patients should always carry a tourniquet. He says twice in the past month, he's seen patients whose lives were saved because they had access to a tourniquet when their vascular shunts ruptured.
