Margaret M. Redfield, M.D., is a consultant in the Division of Cardiovascular Diseases, Department of Internal Medicine, at Mayo Clinic in Rochester. Dr. Redfield serves as director of Mayo's Circulatory Failure program and co-director of the Cardiorenal Laboratory. She is the Walter and Leonore Annenberg Professor in Cardiology and Critical Care, Mayo Clinic College of Medicine, and has full faculty privileges in clinical and translational science at Mayo Graduate School.

Dr. Redfield received her B.S. degree in chemistry and biology from the University of South Dakota and her M.D. degree from Tulane University School of Medicine. She completed a residency in internal medicine and a fellowship in cardiology at Mayo Graduate School, and a research fellowship in cardiovascular research in the Mayo Clinic Cardiorenal Research Laboratory.

Dr. Redfield's clinical practice and research efforts focus on congestive heart failure, echocardiography, diastolic dysfunction, neurohumoral factors in heart failure, and novel therapeutics to treat heart failure (including gene therapy). As a principal investigator, co-investigator and consultant, she has secured competitive funding to support her work, including approximately 100 federal, industry and foundation grants from such organizations as the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute; National Institutes of Health; Medtronic; and the American Heart Association.

Dr. Redfield is frequently invited to present her work nationally and internationally and has authored or co-authored several hundred peer-reviewed articles, book chapters, editorials, abstracts, and letters. She serves in editorial and reviewer positions for publications such as *Journal of Cardiac Failure*; *Congestive Heart Failure*; *New England Journal of Medicine*; *Circulation*; *American Journal of Cardiology*; and *Annals of Internal Medicine*. She has been a study section member and chairperson for the NHLBI.

Throughout her career, Dr. Redfield has received numerous awards and honors, including the Mayo Outstanding Investigator Award, Department of Medicine; the Mayo Outstanding Achievement Award, Cardiovascular Diseases; the Donald C. Balfour Award for Meritorious Research at Mayo Clinic; and the Department of Medicine Landmark Contribution to the Literature Award.

Dr. Redfield holds professional memberships in organizations such as the Central Society for Clinical Research; the American Society for Clinical Investigation and the Association of American Physicians as well as a number of Mayo Clinic committees.
