## Heart Attacks, Breast Cancer Patient iPad

Vivien Williams	Do you know what happens when you have a heart attack? I'm Vivien Williams with your Mayo Clinic Minute.
	Heart attacks happen when fatty deposits called plaques in your arteries get disrupted and form clots that block blood flow. Boston University researchers found a way to look inside arteries with special probes to see if plaques are at high risk of causing issues. More research is needed.
	A diagnosis of breast cancer is never easy. In addition to dealing with the shock, a patient has to digest an overwhelming amount of information. Will I need chemo, what about surgery, what does "stage" mean, etcetera. Mayo Clinic is testing an iPad app to see if it will help make the journey a little easier.
