Vivien Williams	There are five different categories of pulmonary hypertension, so it can be hard to diagnose and treat. Some patients require a heart or lung transplant. Others may benefit from less invasive surgery. There is no cure for pulmonary hypertension, but the key to feeling better is for patients to get an accurate diagnosis.
