Does Peyronie's disease go away?

	"A man should not have a curvature greater than 15 degrees with a spontaneous erection. A man shouldn't be able to feel a lump in the penis, those are not normal and those should take you to your urologist."
	"Peyronie's disease hits them during their most active phase of life when they're 40 to 50 years of age. So the majority of my patients are young, they're sexually active, they have no other problems with erection other than the curvature."
	"Doppler ultrasound will verify the vascular integrity of the erection, meaning I'll be able to clearly see that you have normal blood flow or that you have borderline blood flow, or that your blood flow is actually less than it should be for a man your age."
	"Over the course of eight different injections over many, many, many weeks, the patient does stretching and modeling or uses a device called a traction device to try and extend the penile length."
